## **April 2017 Minutes**

#### From The Pastor's Heart

June 15, 1983, just a few weeks before we moved from our little house in Hillsville to our second appointment (our first parsonage) is a day I will long remember.

Let me set the scene: we lived only four houses away from my parents. My uncle and aunt lived next door to my parents in the old homestead.

It just happened to be my aunt's birthday. My father came home from work for lunch and saw his brother and sister-in-law sitting on their front porch and yelled across the way wishing Aunt Leona happy birthday! Not long after, I was returning from the little local grocery store when I saw my baby sister (who was 13 at the time), running as fast as she could through the yard. Her speed and the look of fear and terror on her face immediately told me something was terribly wrong. I pulled the car over and yelled, "Brenda, what's wrong?" "It's Aunt Leona," she cried. I think she's dead."

I got out of the car and ran to their front porch to find Aunt Leona unresponsive on the floor. My uncle and I administered CPR and mouth to mouth resuscitation. It seemed like the ambulance would never get there. Even though it seemed hopeless, we hoped and prayed as we followed the ambulance.

Our worst fears were realized when the doctor came out and said they did all they could, but Aunt Leona did not survive, she died on her birthday.

John' story of the first Easter is vivid, rich, and full of fascinating details. In John, the little things, the details, are often pregnant with meaning. There is an interesting detail in John's Easter account – everyone was busy running.

The mood was somber, to say the least. Grief was in the air. Hopelessness filled the hearts of the followers of Jesus. It is with this kind of emotion that Mary Magdalene made her way to the tomb to do one last loving thing for her friend, Jesus; she went to anoint his body.

When she discovered the tomb was empty, she interpreted this empty tomb as another tragedy, not only had they killed her Jesus, now someone had stolen his body. She panicked and ran as fast as she could to some of the disciples. Just as I saw my sister run with the speed of lightening and saw the fear and terror on her face, I imagine in my mind's eye that same speed and look on Mary's face. Mary didn't even consider the possibility that Jesus had been raised from the dead. Her hopeless situation grew even more hopeless, if that was possible.

And what happened next? - more running! After Mary cried out that Jesus' body was missing, Peter and the other disciple set out for the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. They saw for themselves that the tomb was empty and returned home overcome with fear and hopelessness.

Mary obviously had run back to the tomb again, because we are told when the disciples returned home (probably more running), Mary remained in the garden where the tomb was located.

According to John, that first Easter there was much running... panicked running... running out of fear and confusion.

All of that fear, confusion, panic and running came to an end when Jesus simply spoke Mary's name.

If you find yourself running (physically or mentally), if you find yourself filled with fear and confusion and panic this Easter, stop for a minute and listen, for the Risen Savior is calling your name. He replaces our fears and hopelessness with peace and life.

#### **HOLY WEEK SERVICES**

#### PALM/PASSION SUNDAY — April 9

On Palm Sunday, Christians celebrate the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, the week before his death and resurrection. Jesus traveled to Jerusalem, knowing that this journey would end in his sacrificial death on the cross for



the sins of humankind. Palm/Passion Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, which concludes on Easter Sunday. The biblical account of Palm Sunday is found in Matthew 21:1-11; Mark 11:1-11; Luke 19:28-44; and John 12:12-19. Palm Sunday commemorates the fulfillment of Zechariah 9:9: "Rejoice greatly, Daughter Zion! Shout, Daughter of Jerusalem! See, your king comes to you, righteous and victorious, lowly and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

As Jesus entered the city, people threw down their cloaks on the path where Jesus rode as an act of homage and submission. They shouted "Hosanna" and waved palm branches and placed them before Jesus. The palm branches symbolized goodness and victory, and the shouts of "Hosanna" were often used to express adoration, praise or joy. In this setting, it is an appeal for deliverance...a plea for salvation. The joy and celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem quickly turned ugly, and the horrific suffering (mental, emotional and physical) comes on the heels of joy and celebration. The Passion of Christ was not always tied with Palm Sunday, but because people do not often attend Holy week services, the two have been combined. The passion narratives are often read on this Sunday.

We will observe Palm/Passion Sunday at both our 9 am Contemporary Service and our 11 am Traditional Service. Both services will begin with the celebratory observance of Palm Sunday. The services will then move into the Passion of the Christ. The Contemporary Service will include the Passion Narratives with song. The Traditional Service will observe the Passion of Jesus through the Cantata: "A Service of Darkness: Seven Choral Meditations on the Last Words of Christ" by Dale Wood. The Chancel Choir will be joined by the Wesley Chorale in this performance.

#### **HOLY THURSDAY (MAUNDY THURSDAY) — April 13**



Holy Thursday is the beginning of the three day celebration of Easter—the most important time of the year for Christians. This period (The Triduum or The Three Days) is one big celebration, remembering the Last Supper, the crucifixion and the death of Jesus, and the Resurrection to

new life. On this day, Christians remember the Last Supper of Jesus Christ with his disciples. This meal was the ancient celebration of the Passover meal - the meal which Jewish people share together to celebrate the time when God delivered Moses and God's people from slavery in Egypt.

The night of Holy Thursday is the night on which Jesus was betrayed by Judas in the Garden of Gethsemane. The word

"Maundy" is derived from the Latin word "mandatum," meaning a commandment. Jesus Christ, at the Last Supper, commanded:

'And now I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.' John 13:34-35

This commandment was given during the Last Supper when Jesus washed his disciples' feet, an act of servitude.

We will observe Holy/Maundy Thursday at a 7 pm service with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

#### GOOD FRIDAY/HOLY FRIDAY — April 14

This is the day on which we commemorate the passion/suffering and death of Jesus on the cross. Many Christians spend this day in fasting, prayer, repentance, and meditation on the agony

and suffering of Christ on the cross. The biblical account of Jesus' death on the cross, or crucifixion, his burial and his resurrection, or raising from the dead, can be found in the following passages of Scripture: Matthew 27:27-28:8; Mark 15:16-16:19; Luke 23:26-24:35; and John 19:16-20:30.

Why is Good Friday referred to as "good"? Why not call it "Bad Friday" or "Sorrowful Friday"? Some believe Good Friday is derived from "God's Friday." Regardless of the origin, the name Good Friday is entirely appropriate because of the suffering and death of Jesus, as horrific as it was, marked the dramatic culmination of God's plan to save God's people from their sins. What the Jewish authorities and Romans did to Jesus was definitely not good. However, the results of Christ's death are very good! God demonstrates God's own love for us in this: "While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8). On Good Friday, we remember the day Jesus willingly suffered and died by crucifixion as the ultimate sacrifice for our sins.

Our Good Friday Service begins at St. Paul's Lutheran Church (616 Washington Street, Sewickley) at 11:30 am with a brief prayer service, followed by the procession to Saint Andrew's, where prayers will be offered. The procession will continue through Sewickley with prayers for all of the local churches, ending at our church, where the service will continue with the dramatic reading of the crucifixion narrative. Those who do not wish to walk the procession may meet at our church at noon.

#### **EASTER SUNDAY — April 16**



This is the day we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior. The word "Easter" does not appear in the Bible and no early church celebrations of Christ's resurrection are mentioned in Scripture. Easter, like Christmas, is

a tradition that developed later in church history.

Most reference books say that the name "Easter" derived from the Eastre, the Teutonic goddess of Spring. For this reason some



Elijah appointed Jehu King over Israel to expunge the House of Jezebel and Ahab from the land. He appointed Hazael King over Syria to stabilize that land. He appointed Elisha his successor prophet to prepare the people for the coming revolution. All three of these men died in 800 BCE. Moses spent 80 years teaching slaves the law and forming them into a nation. Joshua delivered them the land and started the cycle of jubilees. David unified the clans into a kingdom. Each had done his job. Now, by the end of 2 Chronicles/Kings the people understood three

doctrines; life exists under YHWH's immutable moral order, worship is vital to the community, and Elohim's revelation continues past, present & future. 14 years after Elisha died, Amos realized that that YHWH was not just the God of Israel. There is only one God. This was a revolution in human thinking. The monarchy had served its purpose by establishing order and stabilizing the borders. Amos does not focus on kings and priests. He talks to individual people about injustice, sinfulness and false piety. Progressive revelation has just taken a huge leap forward. 

LENTEN FINES 2017 - The Western PA Annual Conference has a strong connection with the Nyadire Connection in Zimbabwe. This year, Lenten Fines will be collected and applied to the Hearing Impaired Program at the Nyadire United Mission. From <a href="mailto:umczea.org">umczea.org</a>, "Deaf people can do anything that hearing people can do...except hear." Singing praises with no words but through the demonstration of gestures they have proved that "Disability is not inability" is not a cliché for the HI (Hearing Impaired) choir at Nyadire CPS (Central Primary School) but a reality. In 2014, the Hearing Impaired program was only at Primary School and not yet implemented in the High school curriculum. The Hearing Impaired (HI) unit that has operated since 1994 came as a response by the United Methodist Church to the plight of the "hard of hearing" children in the Nyadire community. The department is manned by four specialized teachers. Many children either come from disadvantaged families or families who do not see the necessity for educating a deaf child.



The Lenten Fines collected will help continue the work begun to enable all children to fully participate in schooling. Lenten Fines should be brought to church by April 23<sup>rd</sup>. #### NATIVE AMERICAN MINISTRIES SUNDAY — APRIL 30

The Native American Ministries Sunday offering helps United Methodist congregations open doors. One ministry supported by this offering is the outreach ministry at the 25-member Grace Indian UMC Church in Hartshorne, OK. For five years, members of the rural, mostly Native American congregation have dedicated themselves to helping meet the spiritual and emotional needs of students at a nearby Native American boarding school. Jones Academy, founded and supported by the Choctaw Nation, serves about 200 students, K-12, from about 30 different American Indian tribes.

According to the Rev. David Warden, pastor of Grace and a missionary from the Holston Annual Conference, "Many of the students come from struggling families who cannot offer their children a stable home environment or education due to challenges such as lower socioeconomic areas, single parenthood or addiction." Warden says the children at Jones Academy are "priceless; and with the help from Gwen Parish, our children's coordinator and member of the Choctaw tribe, we do our best to continually love them and include them."

Once a month, Grace Church hosts elementary-school students for Sunday worship, which usually includes traditional Choctaw hymns, and fellowship. The children serve as acolytes and ushers, and participate in Holy Communion and sharing joys and concerns. "Children are taught church etiquette and respect and are seated in



the sanctuary according to Indian tradition," says Parish, who notes that VBS curriculum inspires the sermon and after-church activities. After worship, church members lead students in crafts, Bible lessons and recreation activities, including cake and ice cream to celebrate monthly birthdays. In September, church members provide a back-to-school dinner and lead the students in games, crafts and worship. In December, they provide a dinner, read them a Christmas story, lead them in songs and worship, and offer them Christmas gifts.

"These kids don't have a family to come home to when they're at the boarding school," says Parish. "We try to fill

in the family gap and serve as the students' spiritual aunts, uncles (and) grandparents while they are away from home," Parish says. "They need role models beyond what they learn in school. We want to plant spiritual seeds. They are our future tribe as well as our future church. We want to set the standard for how a church treats others."


#### **EASTER PAGEANT**
